Guildhall School Honorands 2022

Fellows

Monica Dolan

Monica Dolan is one of the outstanding actors of her generation. Having graduated from Guildhall School in 1992, Monica has sustained a high profile career on stage and screen, one that is recognised for its versatility and impact.

Monica is a BAFTA award winning actress whose work spans stage, television and film. Highlights include Appropriate Adult, for which she won the BAFTA for Best Supporting Actress, A Very English Scandal (for which she received a BAFTA nomination), The Witness For The Prosecution, The Casual Vacancy, feature film Eye In The Sky opposite Helen Mirren and the late Alan Rickman and, of course, W1A. Most recently, Monica starred alongside Eddie Marsan as Anne and John Darwin in The Thief, His Wife and the Canoe for ITV.

For her stage work, Monica won the Olivier Award for Best Actress in a Supporting Role for her performance as Karen in *All About Eve* (Sonia Friedman Productions). She has also toured globally with the Royal Shakespeare Company in their productions of *King Lear* and *The Seagull*, and performed in *Talking Heads* at the Bridge Theatre and for the BBC. Her play *The B*easts*, in which she also starred, debuted at the Edinburgh Festival in 2017 to rave reviews and a sell-out run and had its London debut at The Bush in February 2018. The play was nominated for Outstanding Achievement in Affiliate Theatre at the 2018 Oliver Awards.

Katharine Lewis

Katharine began working at Guildhall School in 2008 and was Secretary & Dean of Students between 2018 and 2022.

During her time at the School, Katharine played a pivotal role in a number of key institutional achievements, including: helping the School achieving a 'Confidence' result in the 2010 Quality Assurance Agency audit report, being the operational and quality assurance lead for the application and scrutiny for the conferment of Taught Degree Awarding Powers in 2014, leading on the preparation for our submission for the Teaching Excellence Framework, which saw us achieve Gold in 2018, as well as leading on our registration with the Office for Students in 2019.

In her role at the School, Katharine was a valued member of the Executive and Senior Management Teams, and as Chair of the Operations Board, she oversaw the provision of day-to-day operational policy and processes in key areas to support both staff and students in the work they undertook and to ensure the effective running of the School. Katharine worked collaboratively across the School and with the Board of Governors to excellent effect, particularly in respect to the academic regulatory framework and compliance to ensure that the School maintained its designated status within the higher education community, and ensuring we met our obligations under the Higher Education Code of Governance.

As Secretary and Dean of Students, Katharine led a number of well-respected key professional service departments with responsibility for delivering frontfacing student services within the School, including Student Affairs, Registry and Library Services. These departments touch on the entire student journey, from welcoming students through the door and ensuring they are enrolled, to supporting them both educationally and pastorally through to completion and the graduation ceremony. Alongside these recognised areas, Katharine also established the Associate Dean of Teaching & Learning role to support pedagogic development in the School's degree programmes, and the Access and Participation Office, encouraging undergraduate applications from underrepresented groups and ensuring there are no barriers to deter talented students from applying and coming to the School. Throughout the pandemic, Katharine provided clear operational leadership, ensuring that the student experience was at the forefront of staff thinking when planning for alternative delivery of the curriculum, and that professional service departments recognised and responded to the varying needs of the students over this challenging period.

Zara McFarlane

Zara McFarlane is a jazz/soul singer and songwriter who graduated from Guildhall School in 2009. Zara has gone on to become one of the UK's foremost Black British jazz vocalists. She was awarded the title of Best Jazz Act at the MOBO Awards in 2014 and has twice won Jazz FM's Vocalist of the Year.

Zara made her solo outing in 2010 when she issued her self-produced EP, *Until Tomorrow*, catching the attention of Gilles Peterson who released her debut album of the same title the following year on his label Brownswood Recordings. Positioned neatly between the worlds of modern jazz and nu-soul, it confirmed the presence of a very special artist, receiving rave reviews and a MOBO Award Nomination, and heralding a major new talent in the world of British Jazz.

Her sophomore album, *If You Knew Her*, garnered further recognition, winning three awards: a Best Jazz MOBO Award 2014, an Urban Music Award for Best Jazz Act 2015 and a Jazz FM Award for Vocalist of the Year in 2015.

Her third album, *Arise*, released in 2017, saw her blossom as a lyrically conscious songwriter and showcased a more ambitious body of work drawing from many influences; from the deep spiritual jazz reminiscent of the 'spiritual jazz' movement and of 70s Black America to soul, jazz, dub and reggae winning the Jazz FM Vocalist of the Year Award again in 2018, and the Session of the Year at Worldwide Awards in 2018 too.

Her fourth and most recent album, *Songs of an Unknown Tongue* is a fresh departure in her creative direction, an exploration of the meeting points between current electronic sounds and the traditional rhythms of Jamaica and weaves a subversion of the colonial legacy of slavery. It too received great critical acclaim receiving a five star review from MOJO magazine.

Zara has also worked in the theatre with the Royal Shakespeare Company as a featured singer in *Anthony and Cleopatra*, directed by Iqbal Khan with music written by Laura Mvula and with Glyndebourne Opera. She was a judge on the UK TV show BBC Young Musician in 2018 and features on the house music legend Louie Vega's Grammynominated album *Starring XXVIII*.

Zara is a keen educator and regularly delivers workshops at Guildhall School and other conservatoires, as well as within local communities. For the School, she has recently supported our Girls in Jazz day, as well as offered workshops as part of Elevate, our online careers events for graduates.

Eliot Shrimpton

Eliot is Head of Acting Practice at Guildhall School.

Eliot studied theology at Cambridge University and subsequently trained as an actor at Guildhall School and the École Philippe Gaulier in Paris, with credits including the Nurse and Friar Lawrence in Romeo and Juliet (Shakespeare's Globe). He has taught and collaborated at leading schools and arts institutions throughout the world including: São Paulo Drama School (Brazil), National Autonomous University of Mexico, École de Sables (Senegal), Central Academy of Drama (Beijing), Primo del Teatro (Italy), Royal School for Performing Arts (Madrid), Superior School of Dramatic Art (Barcelona), National School of Performing Arts (Copenhagen), National Theatre School of Strasbourg (France), National Institute of Performing Arts (Brussels), Amherst College (USA), Escuela Del Actor (Uruguay), NEOIIBA (Brazil) and the Royal Central School of Speech and Drama (London).

Eliot has worked as an educational consultant for the Ministry of Education in Japan, and as a Japanese speaker has interpreted for the National Kabuki Theatre of Japan. Since 2014, Eliot has collaborated with a range of international practitioners in mask work to develop a unique series of mask designs and an innovative approach to artistic training with mask. He holds a doctorate for his practice-based research into 'Beautiful Idiots: the Embodiment of the Fool'. Eliot is a Senior Fellow of the Higher Education Academy.

During his time at the School and significantly over the last two years, Eliot has provided vital stability, ensuring students maintained a world-leading standard of Acting training whilst the Drama department underwent a profound period of necessary cultural change. His thoughtful stewardship of the revalidation process for the BA (Hons) Acting programme enabled the Acting senior staff team to enter the revalidation event with confidence and present a programme that was praised as "a beacon of excellence for the sector" by the revalidation panel. Eliot's deep and longstanding knowledge of the programme, and of the experience of an actor in training at Guildhall, has proved invaluable as we develop a training fit for the 21st century. His skill, care and commitment to the Acting programme are a cause for both recognition and celebration.

Gemma Tonge

Gemma graduated from Guildhall School in 2002 with a BA Hons in Stage Management and Technical Theatre. Since leaving, Gemma has curated a successful portfolio career that spans multiple art forms and scales.

Gemma began her career in opera and dance working for the major opera companies - Opera North, English National Opera and Scottish Opera. Gemma was Company Stage Manager for the Linbury Studio, Royal Opera House for seven years before moving to be Touring Company Stage Manager at Sadler's Wells for eight years, where she worked both in the UK and internationally, touring to over 67 international venues. During this time, for her work on Matthew Bourne's Swan Lake, she was first nominated for the Stage Management Association Stage Manager of the Year award.

Alongside her work in opera and dance, Gemma worked regularly in events. Gemma acted as Stage Manager for Edinburgh Hogmanay, as well as Latitude Festival, TedX, IDEX Abu Dhabi, Piccadilly Circus for the Olympic Celebrations 2012 and BBC Young Dancer of the Year.

Gemma's path moved towards theatre with the Royal Shakespeare Company's co-production of *As You Like It* at Sheffield Theatres. She moved to the National Theatre for *Emil and the Detectives* in 2013, managing a cast of 12 adults, 180 children, a band and even live animals. For this production, Gemma won the Stage Management Association's Individual Stage Manager of the Year award 2014.

She worked for Manchester International Festival as Company Manager for the European tour of *Life and Death of Marina Abramovic* in 2012; Kenneth Branagh's site-specific *Macbeth* in 2013, which was internationally broadcast and also ran at the Park Avenue Armory, New York City in 2014, and acted as the Project Manager for the international tour of *Tree of Codes* in 2016/17.

Gemma continued her relationship with the Kenneth Branagh Theatre Company as Company Manager for the year-long *Plays* at the Garrick West End season 2015-2016 (Garrick Theatre). For her work on this season, Gemma won the Technical Theatre Award for Outstanding Achievement in Company Management 2016.

Gemma returned to the National Theatre in 2017, where she is now, to the newly created role of Head of Company Stage Management, the first person to hold this post. Most recently, she has been responsible for successfully bringing productions back into the rehearsal rooms and NT stages during the pandemic under challenging COVID restrictions.

John-Paul Williams

John-Paul (JP) is Guildhall School's Concert Piano Technician.

JP's work has enhanced the reputation of Guildhall School, not only in reference to teaching – his work on the teaching pianos has made the School's piano fleet one of the most respected in the world – but also his work with visiting artists, both those invited by the School and those invited to perform as part of the Barbican's Milton Court concert series. Through this work, JP has ensured that Milton Court Concert Hall is seen as a major concert venue of world-class standing.

Visiting professors and artists, current professors and students all recognise that Guildhall School pianos are among the best in any conservatoire in the world. JP's technical skills are acknowledged at an international level, and his ability to relate to young artists makes him truly unique among his profession. JP's work has been mentioned and endorsed by, amongst others: Richard Goode, Jonathan Biss, Yuja Wang, Jeremy Denk, Isata Kanneh-Mason, Erland Cooper, and Benjamin Grosvenor. His collegiality and readiness to support, advise and discuss are also key to the thriving Guildhall School/Barbican music relationship, which continues to go from strength to strength.

JP is a regular contributor, lecturer and teacher to Piano Technicians Associations in the UK, Europe and the US.

Lynne Williams

Lynne Williams was Principal of Guildhall School from January 2017 until August 2021.

During that time, Lynne oversaw a number of major developments and successes, including: developing a new strategic plan and business model for the institution; broadening of the School's mission to highlight artistic entrepreneurship, community engagement, interdisciplinary practice and artistic citizenship; implementing a School-wide approach to Equality, Diversity and Inclusion; and steering the School through the challenges of the pandemic with a transition to delivering high quality online teaching and learning, including the development of ground-breaking low latency technology to enable this to happen.

During Lynne's tenure, Guildhall School was ranked as the top UK conservatoire in the 2021 Guardian music and drama league tables, sixth in the world for performing arts in the QS World University Rankings 2020, and in the top 10 of all UK universities for student satisfaction in the 2020 National Student Survey, as well as receiving a Gold Award in the 2018 Teaching Excellence and Student Outcomes Framework (TEF).

Before joining Guildhall School, Lynne was the Director/CEO of Australia's National Institute of Dramatic Art (NIDA) where she led transformative change including the construction of the NIDA Graduate School, opened by the Australian Prime Minister, and the launch of a new suite of Master of Fine Arts courses. Prior to NIDA, Lynne held many arts and cultural leadership positions in the UK.

She led the development of the Culture, Ceremonies and Education Programme for the London Organising Committee of the Olympic Games (LOCOG), following her contribution to London 2012's successful Olympic Bid as a Cultural Advisor/ Creative Producer. Lynne was also Artistic Director of Cardiff 2008, the company bidding for Cardiff to be 2008 European Capital of Culture.

Her experience in performing arts began in Australia where she studied and performed as a professional singer, specialising in contemporary music and music theatre. On moving to the UK in 1985, she extended her arts experience through her work as Director of Performing Arts for the East of England, and later, as Artistic Director/CEO of Eastern Touring Agency. She expanded her own arts practice by writing opera libretti with a number of British composers. Her work commissioned by English National Opera Studio enjoyed London performances and a national tour. She also wrote and presented music programmes for BBC Radio.

Lynne has a deep commitment to arts education and increased public access and has developed and promoted work across the full spectrum of the arts. She served on the Arts Council England Touring Panel and was also an Arts Council England advisor for contemporary music, opera, theatre and dance. She has served as a chair, a board and committee member of a variety of arts companies in both the UK and Australia and has been honoured with numerous awards. In 2019, she was appointed a Member of the Order of Australia (AM).

Honorary Fellows

Armin Zanner

Armin Zanner is Interim Director of Music & Head of Vocal Studies at Guildhall School.

Born in Glasgow, Armin began his performing life as a violinist and was educated at Selwyn College, Cambridge, where he led the university orchestra. He wrote his MPhil thesis on the violin sonatas of Béla Bartók, before shifting focus and moving to Guildhall School to specialise as a singer, subsequently performing as a baritone in recital, concert and opera throughout the UK, Europe and North America.

In his work at Guildhall School, Armin has expanded student performance opportunities, establishing the '...at Six' concert series and commissioning new music for the Reflective Conservatoire and Extraordinary Voices Festival. He has helped build wide-ranging performance projects into the curriculum, integrated performer health into the training of singers, strengthened the international network of visiting artists and embedded collaborative activity in the vocal programme. This has led to crossdepartmental initiatives within Guildhall and joint activity with partners like Barbican, Wigmore Hall and Royal Opera.

In addition to his work at Guildhall School, Armin is a trustee of NW Live Arts, a London-based charity creating performances for communities to explore social themes such as migration, climate or mental health through classical music from different global traditions. Armin is also an artistic director of the Franz-Schubert-

Institut in Austria and has been on faculty at summer programmes including the Internationale Meistersinger Akademie in Germany. He has led masterclasses and workshops in the UK and internationally for institutions including the Sibelius Academy, Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts and Buchmann-Mehta School of Music.

Armin has served on competition juries such as the Donatella Flick LSO Conducting Competition, Royal Philharmonic Society Opera and Music Theatre Award, Korean Voice Competition and Glyndebourne's Gus Christie Award. His writing has been published by Bloomsbury and in numerous UK and US magazines. Armin has been a creative director of the Innovative Conservatoire, an international professional development scheme for conservatoire teachers, and is a Senior Fellow of the Higher Education Academy.

Michael Hoffman

Michael Hoffman served on the Guildhall School Board of Governors and on the Guildhall School Trust for nine years between 2010 and 2019. During his service, he dedicated time and expertise to the governance and wellbeing of the School's future and worked extensively on fundraising for the £11m Milton Court Campaign, in addition to being a major donor to the project.

Michael is an American/Austrian who grew up in Europe and the United States. He earned his BA Cum Laude from the University of Texas, an MA in Economics and International Affairs from Columbia University, and an MBA from the Harvard Business School. Michael served ten years as Chair of Columbia University's School of International Affairs and in 1996 received Columbia's Alumni Distinguished Service Award.

He spent fourteen years in international management consulting with McKinsey & Co., Arthur D. Little, and as a Partner with Booz Allen Hamilton, working throughout Europe and the Asia Pacific area. Michael joined leading international private equity firm Warburg Pincus in New York and London, opening their first international office in 1987. In 2000, he founded his own private equity firm, Palamon Capital Partners, which he co-managed until 2017. On retirement, Michael immediately took on other advisory work with private investment companies, including acting as Senior Advisor to Santé Ventures for the last four years, a leading US firm investing in biotech, medtech and health tech companies.

A passionate supporter of the arts, Michael joined Sam Wanamaker as his business partner in 1972 to develop the Strategic Plan for building Shakespeare's Globe on the South Bank, where he served as a Founding Director for fifteen years, and continues to serve as a Member of the US Board. He was an Associate of the Really Useful Group and an original investor with Andrew Lloyd Webber in *Joseph and the* Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat, CATS, Starlight Express, and Phantom of the Opera amongst other productions, and also served on the Boards of the Royal Court Theatre, Royal Shakespeare Company, and the Almeida Theatre.

Michael served as Chairman for the Philharmonia Orchestra for six years with Esa Pekka Salonen, and as a member of the Development Board of Garsington Opera for ten years. In addition, he served as Chairman of the Development Board of the Museum of London, Chairman of the City of London Festival, as a Trustee of the Science Museum Board, Chairman of the Board of London Archaeology (MOLA), and Chairman of Richmond, the American University of London.

For the past twelve years, Michael has served as a Trustee of the George Washington University, as Founding Chairman of the International Board of The University of Texas, and as a member of the Columbia University President's Advisory Council.

Michael was given the Freedom of the City of London in 2017.

Dr Michael Shipley & Philip Rudge

Dr Michael Shipley and Philip Rudge are civil partners who have supported Guildhall School for 15 years, including providing a named scholarship since 2011. In addition to their major gift philanthropy, particularly in the area of opera, they have donated to the School as regular attendees at special income generating events, and they have helped to drive and support outreach and community projects between the School and external partners. They are passionate supporters of the arts across a wide range of organisations, including the English National Opera, Salisbury Musical Society, Wilton's Music Hall, the Edinburgh International Festival, and Scottish Opera.

The School is grateful for this opportunity to honour Michael who died in July 2022. Mike was a leading rheumatologist and specialist in chronic pain. He was a trustee of the British Association of Performing Arts Medicine with a particular interest in musculoskeletal problems in performing artists. He wrote several textbooks and contributed to others on rheumatology and chronic pain. He was also a trustee of the Friends of University College London Hospitals (UCLH) and in 2016 Michael and Philip funded a pilot of the School's Music, Memory & Me project on the care for the elderly wards at UCLH. Thanks to Mike's introduction to UCLH, Music, Memory & Me went on to be supported by the Friends of UCLH and The UCLH Charity and received the Better Healthcare Award for Best Collaborative Arts Project in 2017.

While Philip shared Mike's interest and passion for these projects, particularly in the fields of education and the arts, his career took a different path, namely international development and human rights. After studies at the universities of London and Tuebingen (Germany) he worked as an advisor on refugee education to the World University Service in London. After extensive work-related travel in Europe and Latin America he went to Laos in South-East Asia for four years under the so-called Colombo Plan for the reconstruction of Indo-China after the wars that ravaged the region in the 1960s and 70s. On his return to the UK he was invited to set up a non-governmental European to assert the right of asylum and the protection of refugees. Philip became the first Secretary General of the European Council On Refugees and Exiles (ECRE).

Judith Weir CBE

Composer Judith Weir CBE has helped transform the face of music in Great Britain. Since 2014, Judith Weir has served as Master of the Queen's (now King's) Music, one of the highest honours for a British composer. Her priorities in this role have included the support of school music teachers, of amateur orchestras and choirs, and of rural festivals. During her tenure she has written music for national and royal occasions, including Her Late Majesty the Queen's 90th birthday celebrations and the UK's official commemoration of the 1918 Armistice.

Judith originally studied as an oboe player, performing with the National Youth Orchestra of Great Britain, and studied composition with John Tavener. She went on to Cambridge University, where her composition teacher was Robin Holloway; and in 1975 attended summer school at Tanglewood, where she worked with Gunther Schuller. After this, she spent several years working in schools and adult education in rural southern England, teaching at Glasgow University and the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland.

Her operas include King Harald's Saga, The Black Spider, A Night at the Chinese Opera, The Vanishing Bridegroom and Blond Eckbert.

Judith's most recent opera, Miss Fortune, premiered at Bregenz in 2011, the Royal Opera House in 2012, and was most recently staged by Guildhall School in spring 2022.

As resident composer with the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra in the 1990s, she wrote several works for orchestra and chorus (including *Forest*, *Storm* and *We*

are Shadows) which were premiered by the orchestra's then Music Director, Simon Rattle. She has been commissioned by the Boston Symphony Orchestra (Music Untangled and Natural History) the Minnesota Orchestra (The Welcome Arrival of Rain) and the London Sinfonietta (Tiger under the Table); and has written concert works for some notable singers, including Jane Manning, Jessye Norman, Dawn Upshaw, Alice Coote, Ailish Tynan and Ruby Hughes.

In recent years, Judith Weir has considerably expanded her choral catalogue, with regular performance by choirs worldwide of music such as her Christmas carol *Illuminare*, *Jerusalem* written for Stephen Cleobury and the choir of King's College Cambridge. As associate composer with the BBC Singers (2015–2019) she completed two oratorios; *In the Land of Uz*, about the prophet Job; and *blue hills beyond blue hills*, to Zen-influenced verse by the Scottish poet Alan Spence.

Judith holds a long association with Spitalfields Music Festival, and has taught as a visiting professor at Princeton, Harvard and Cardiff universities. Honours for her work include the Critics' Circle, South Bank Show, Ivor Novello and Elise L Stoeger awards, a CBE and The Queen's Medal for Music. Her music has been widely recorded, particularly on the NMC and Delphian labels; and is published by Chester Music and Novello & Co. Her work continues to make a significant impact globally and is a cornerstone of repertoire for students at the School, where we have held a day dedicated to her compositions.

Music before the Ceremony will be played by the Guildhall Brass Soloists conducted by Will O'Sullivan.

The Sheriff's and Lord Mayor's Processions enter to the March from *Scipio* by Handel.
